Brooklyn Village Board Meeting Minutes March 12, 2018

The March 12, 2018 Village Board meeting of the Village of Brooklyn was called to order at 6:38 p.m. at the Brooklyn Village Hall by President Clayton Schulz. Trustees present were Todd Klahn, Brittany Springer and Sue McCallum. Heather Kirkpatrick and Russell Cazier were absent. Others present were Chief Engelhart and Clerk-Treasurer Linda Kuhlman. Public Works Director Mark Langer was absent. All present stood for the Pledge of Allegiance.

Public Comments – None.

Klahn made a motion to approve minutes of 2-26-18. Schulz seconded. Motion carried. **Schulz made a motion to approve minutes of 3-5-18.** Klahn seconded. Motion carried. **President's Report** – None.

Clerk's Report – Deposits for February totaled \$121,451, of which \$51,375 were from taxes. Withdrawals totaled \$447,909, of which \$301,738 were February tax settlement and \$39,491 was debt service. Auditors were here last Thursday and Friday, March 8 and 9. Everything went well. We should get a draft by mid-April and then set up time for them to present to the board. The April 3 election is coming up – Supreme Court Justice, county court races, school board races, local races. Still looking for poll workers. We received a Thank You from UB&T of a plant and Thanks a Lot cookies.

Safety Report – Chief Engelhart is starting to get Brooklyn PD numbers from new computer system. Being in two counties it's difficult to get the Dane and Green numbers. He still needs to manually separate the calls into the categories on the reports. We had 36 calls last month that Brooklyn officers took. Last month Dane County came into the Village 22 times, including traffic stops and calls of any kind. Green County came into the Village 11 times. **There were a total of 69 calls in the Village in February.** Dane County numbers he can get through the computer system, but he will have to call Green County every month. Once the new full-time officer is hired, the Village will take most of the calls. If board wants the numbers broken out for both counties and Brooklyn, he will have to do that manually. Klahn would like a sense of what the police department is doing and also would like to know if there are reoccurring issues in village; for example, if we're starting to get more drug-related or more domestic, what are the trends. Engelhart will manually go through calls and put into the forms. Klahn doesn't want Dane County/Green County necessarily broken out into categories, just the number of calls. Engelhart will give the count and break down the Village calls and update if there's something significant from the counties. **Chief Engelhart gave a verbal report of calls for last month. Kosharek finished up the Rescue Kids Community Education** at the fire station. **Girl Scouts gave thank yous to police department** for one of their badges. Both items were put up on Facebook. **The squad camera is installed** and software is updated. The company still has to send the USB keys for officers. The camera automatically downloads to office when the squad is pulled up in front of building. Springer asked about the school superintendent's email regarding a **school security meeting**. Engelhart did get an email from superintendent's secretary. The meeting was last Thursday at the fire department. – Dan Dean, Brian Busler, the head of security at Oregon School, Spilde and Engelhart were present. They're trying to put together a training session with Brooklyn, Oregon, Fitchburg and Stoughton, but there's differing policies from the different communities that need to come together. They're working on completing a policy. Springer asked if Engelhart is aware of the **school walk-out** that's happening soon but not necessarily at the elementary school. Engelhart was not aware. He has a meeting with school principal on Wednesday and he's been in contact with Oregon School District.

Parking on Division Street for the Lutheran Church – Chief Engelhart said this was discussed over a year ago. He thinks it's a safety issue, same as the passing zone on south side of town. There is now parking in the wider section on both sides of the street and no parking in the narrow section. He would recommend leaving it alone so we don't have parking issues. If we make south side parking, people will be too close to the stop sign and it will be a safety issue. McCallum proposed to go with what is in the drawing – on the north side of street where there is no parking now, change signs to say No Parking Except Holidays and Sundays, and the south side wouldn't change. Engelhart stated they should consider the Memorial weekend tractor pull carryover parking, the August bicycle route which is on Sunday, and then the Labor Day weekend. In his opinion it was discussed a year ago and the decision was due to the safety aspect. The church has an area where they could mow, grade and have a dirt or gravel parking lot area. They have other options. McCallum said it would be extra parking for 4-6 cars on the street. Klahn said they have a lot of older people and for 3 days out of 52 weekends, he's willing to take the risk.

Springer said people have been parking in her driveway, and she knows they've talked about it and talked about getting handicap parking. She doesn't see a lot of people parking there on Labor Day. **Klahn made a motion to change the three signs on north side of Division Street from No Parking to No Parking Anytime Except Sundays and Holidays.** Engelhart also suggested Village paint the corners by the stop sign so people can't park that close to the stop sign. Klahn agreed. McCallum seconded. Motion carried.

Parking in alley – Engelhart had one person complain that people are parking longer than 48 hours in the alley. He hasn't seen any problems. He thinks the problem will get bigger as time goes on. In order to alleviate any issues, we have to enforce it now. He suggested six signs, one at each entrance and four in between. Springer asked if the company on Hotel Street has signs for customer parking. Engelhart doesn't think so, but those aren't the problem. It's the spots on the west end that have the complaint and it's residents on Commercial Street who are parking there. There have been no formal complaints, just verbal. On the north side of alley people are starting to park next to buildings, and Police and Public Works are looking at having a line painted from end to end and paint no parking in that area. **Schulz made a motion to post alley parking lot with signs that say Parking For More Than 48 Hours Continuous is Prohibited.** Klahn seconded. Motion carried.

Public Works – Kuhlman stated Arbor Day will be celebrated on April 27. Public Works Director Langer will again invite the 4th Graders to help plant trees. **Schulz made a motion to approve the Arbor Day Resolution 2018-06.** Resolution was read. McCallum seconded. Motion carried. Discussion on joining MEG, Municipal Environmental Group, to help with the approval of the Water Quality Trading agreements by the DNR. We can receive up to 5 hours of legal advice by joining. **Schulz made a motion to approve joining of MEGs for both sewer and water.** Klahn seconded. Motion carried. Kuhlman stated the Village received notification from Dane County Transportation to list any projects we have on county roads in the coming years. We have none. Klahn said to just fill it out and send it in. Kuhlman stated there was an issue with the influent pump #2 check valves being plugged on February 20 and they need to be replaced. Langer received a quote for \$4,500 but is waiting for an additional quote. **Klahn made motion not to exceed \$4,500 for check valves replacement for influent pump.** Schulz seconded. Motion carried. **Utility report** – water main break this morning on Second Street. Well 2 DNR inspection was on February 20 and passed. There was a broken water main on S. First Street a week ago. When the water main broke it blew out the sewer lateral, which needed to be replaced up the house. There were high flows on February 20 with the flooding but it was handled. We applied for state money for the flooding issues but didn't incur enough expenses to qualify for reimbursement. Strand received notification from DNR that they had received a response from the EPA regarding our trading. DNR should be getting a response to us by mid-week. **Public Works Report** – Chad Klahn passed one of the four wastewater tests, resolved issue with the LED sign laptop, had a planning progress meeting on the S. Kerch Street/Hilltops project and ad for bids will go out next week. The bid opening is April 5. They started to take down 3 trees on S. Kerch Street as part of the construction project. No burials. Some fascia trim came off the Legion pavilion and has been replaced. They fixed the Smithfield Park light fixture and applied for Focus on Energy funds.

Schulz and McCallum reviewed the bills. **Schulz made a motion to approve the bills as presented.** McCallum seconded. Motion carried.

Kuhlman stated the fair market value was figured for each property being purchased on S. Kerch Street, along with a rental rate for easement use and an additional amount to each owner for waiving appeal rights. Discussion on figuring acquisition amounts. **Klahn made a motion to offer to pay fair market value for square footage assessed plus the rental of the easement portion of the property as stated, and if everybody agrees without contesting the amounts, we will cover the assessed costs of putting sidewalk in driveways.** Schulz seconded. Motion carried. **Schulz made a motion to adopt the Relocation Order to acquire land or interests therein.** Klahn seconded. Motion carried.

Operator license was postponed. **Ehlers financing proposal** – an updated proposal based on discussions from last meeting was handed out. The Highway 104 project was left in for discussion purposes. The \$68,000 for the plow truck cannot be in same bond as the street work, because a vehicle cannot be put in under a bond. They put \$40,000 for a stormwater pump instead; that can be borrowed under a bond. Klahn doesn't want to pay \$40,000 for a pump. Langer is still looking at getting a used pump, and they will only need one pump that can handle both stormwater and sewer. Kuhlman stated Langer explained the GIS system is having PW go to each residence and tag on the computer where the shutoff valve is for each property. That translates into a map on the computer for future use. **Discussion on financing/borrowing documents.** Kuhlman relayed answers from Langer on questions brought up at last meeting – board was given a photo of the fiberglass building that was discussed, and the new building discussed in the financing for the phosphorus upgrades is for extra shop

space and additional room to work. Equipment replacement fund – the fabric roof cover replacement can be used from those funds and Travis Anderson from Strand will explore what else can be funded using the equipment replacement fund. The fencing around the stormwater pond on Lincoln Street – pricing didn't include surveying and there needs to be a discussion with property owners on putting fencing around the pond. The board will earmark fund balance money, but Klahn suggested sending a letter to the owners to come to meeting to discuss the option or send comments in. Legion Park bathrooms – Langer had gotten a quote in the past for tearing down and putting in new bathroom and also for remodeling the existing. Klahn would like a new bathroom and would like to explore other contractors for quotes. McCallum said we can take down structure ourselves. Klahn suggested getting a few more estimates and continuing with the 20 x 30 size with 4 stools in the women's and 2 stools and 3 urinals in the men's. Bowman Street – handed out the previous sketch that Strand had done of three options, but there was never engineering done. Klahn would like to look at option of reconstructing street and regrading the street to drain to First Street with new curb/gutter, etc. McCallum would like to see if that option is viable.

Fund balance – Kuhlman stated last year's balance was \$672,000, of which about \$350,000 should not be used. Used about \$50,000 last year, and so far this year board has earmarked about \$10,000 in engineering to carry over into this year, \$10,000 for the sewer rate study and a few smaller items carried over from last year, and \$100,000 in 2017 to TID for finishing street in Business Complex. Should still have about \$200,000 in fund balance this year. McCallum said if do \$67,000 for fiberglass structure, the pump for \$40,000, that's \$100,000, and don't know what our portion of stormwater basin in Business Complex will be. Kuhlman stated once the audit comes back mid-April or early May, should know what the fund balance will be. Klahn suggested waiting until Business Complex is finished first and see what have left over for fund balance. Next would be the fiberglass building and a used pump. Kuhlman reminded the board the plow truck could be borrowed for separately. Klahn asked when the general fund would be paid back from the TID. Kuhlman stated it will be a few years because the TID isn't generating much income yet, and once it does, the loan has to be paid back first to the general fund.

McCallum made a motion to hire Ehlers to do GO Bond debt in the amount of approximately \$900,000 for the S. Kerch, Hilltop Circle, Hilltop Court road, sewer and water projects. Schulz seconded. Motion carried.

Klahn suggested holding off on fund balance items until we get the audit back. **McCallum made a motion to spend up to \$40,000 to replace the torn fabric cover on Public Works building, get two quotes, and use funds in the Equipment Replacement Fund.** Schulz seconded. Motion carried. Klahn suggested looking at what payments would be on \$140,000 for 5 years at 5% interest for a new loader and compare different quotes. **Sidewalk plan** – Schulz said board had talked about doing something with the zone 1 school area, and there are two options -- where it's 3 feet, keep 3 feet, or make it 5 feet standard. McCallum said Village can do a variance to go around a tree, as an example, so can make that adjustment to the width, or can the sidewalk go right to curb so there is no terrace. Klahn said we would then need a policy to windrow the snow and haul it away. Can't leave it on the street. McCallum said can put it up on sidewalk in what would be a two-foot area. Springer asked if sidewalk from street with no terrace, what about short driveways. McCallum said it would be the same thing. Klahn said we will need to budget money to engineer a plan first and will have to talk about using fund balance this year for that. McCallum said we could bid out the engineering for that project. Postpone discussion until May.

Fire/EMS District – McCallum handed out the March 7 agenda and the minutes from December 20. The Commission did not meet in between. She also handed out current fire and EMS budget documents and minutes from the EMS business meetings. EMS had a data recap for 2017 -- 17,855 hours for volunteers, 24 licensed EMTs, 5 EMRs and 4 drivers, and 7 ranked close to over 1,000 hours in 2017. 2,524 daytime hours were filled by part-time employees. Ambulance was out of service 180 hours. There were 164 calls responded to in 2017. Fire department and EMS did not spend all of their budgets from last year. Total of \$56,746 for EMS. There is a special meeting tomorrow night, but 3rd Wednesday in April is next regular meeting, and they will be discussing the leftover balances before the audit. The audit should be done by end of May. Fire Department had a leftover balance of \$15,564. The Commission instructed both entities to come up with ideas on how to handle money. EMS is looking at how to utilize the \$56,000 to get more paid staff in. They have now someone working 3 days a week and 2 others that fill in other days and they're having problems with Fridays. Klahn said the \$56,000 helps but it's a one-time deal. McCallum said they're discussing what to do to get these people. Our run volume is not high enough to get experienced people, so what's available are young people without experience, so they're looking at what the money can do to help get those young people and how to incorporate them into the service. The Commission will also look at giving some back to communities, looking at per capita rate, etc. Klahn said put toward new ambulance fund or put it toward equipment fund for fire engine. Schulz added they will also be getting the SCBA tanks. McCallum said they set aside money for that already.

Springer asked if they're still out of service; and if so, how much. McCallum said in 2017 they were out of service for 180 hours. Klahn asked if out of service hours include service hours when on call but not at station. Schulz said if they're on call, they don't have to be at station. The out of service hours are when they call 911 comm center and say they are not on duty. Sometimes they will have a driver on duty or one EMT, they will still be in service because they will say page for a driver or page for another EMT. Klahn said that's pretty low and that's why he wanted to know what out of service means. He said, staff is volunteers, but if not enough staff to run ambulance but still in service and then they call out someone else, he doesn't want to see that. He'd rather see them go out of service, because that's a bigger picture to communicate to the area to get volunteers. Klahn would rather see higher out of service numbers to reflect when just one person is on. He doesn't see that as a negative on the people; he sees it as we need more people, and without that need, people won't step up. Klahn thinks it's great the volunteers we have want to be in service, but doesn't want to have our ambulance called and we can't make run and then lose time to call another ambulance. That's his concern, and he would rather have it out of service. Schulz agrees need to prove that we need help. McCallum said the EMS director said they're looking at combining services, because they have firefighters that can be on EMS. Klahn's first concern in combining is the community has to provide fire service but does not by statute have to provide EMS service, and if it gets to the point where communities can't afford EMS services, it's hard to separate back out again. McCallum will see what they come forward with. Klahn said he's of the vision that it should be the county with a central hub and satellites that whole county takes care of, and the county should be broken up in segments and it's a county-run thing. McCallum said with the five municipalities, we do have some cooperation already. Springer asked when sometimes there is only one person on call, what happens. Schulz said they get a call, someone sees a person is on duty on their phone, they'll call that person's cell phone, or call the radio or the comm center, and if no one responds within 2 minutes, they send the next rig.

Recreation Committee – ordering banners with last year funds and the media committee will talking about adding in Welcome Bicyclists banner. Recreation Committee would like president to come to a committee meeting and talk with them.

Springer had a question on the protocol for complaints. She saw they had a citizen complaint come in. Schulz said it goes to president to investigate. Klahn asked if there is a policy for handling complaints. Schulz said clerk will check policies. Kuhlman stated the board did make a motion in the past to put audio up on the website, so that can be done.

Klahn made a motion to adjourn at 9 p.m. Schulz seconded. Motion carried.
